

Last month, TBC supervisor Ilia traveled to Washington D.C. for a biennial conference of the National Library Service For The Blind and Print Disabled (NLS). There was a tour of the Library Of Congress Jefferson building, a tour of the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial library of Washington D.C., and a tour of the Bureau Of Engraving And Printing where the Talking Book Center was recognized as being the first NLS network library to provide iBill Currency Readers directly to patrons! Retired Judge David Tatel was a keynote speaker, and the conference was very informative. The NLS will be coming out with a new digital talking book player by early next year. The iBill Currency Reader is a small, compact device that runs on an AAA battery, which is included. To use the currency reader, simply insert



a U.S. paper bill into the reader and press the button. The machine will say "one", "five", "ten" or will vibrate short and long dashes. This device is completely free and patrons can keep it. 




The Pike Place Market has been around since 1907and has its share of ghosts to prove it. Some like to hang out in the bars that occupy the site of a former mortuary.

While the weather is temperate, the family survives on the generosity of locals. But when winter descends, Ernt's mental health fractures. 2018.

DB84392 A Man Called Ove by Fredrik Backman (general fiction) Ove has always been a grumpy man, and when he loses his wife and his job, he decides to commit suicide. But a lively family of new neighbors and a stray cat might give Ove a reason to keep living. 2013.


DB97929 Such A Fun Age by Kiley Reid (general fiction)

employer is determined to make things right. 2019.












Everybody Loves A Circus: Nonfiction:

DB96289 Barnum: An American Life by Robert Wilson Biography of P. T. Barnum, the co-creator of Barnum & Bailey Circus and master of reinvention. Examines the showman's early life, successes and setbacks, entrepreneurship, personal tragedies, and controversies that sprang from the lengths he would go to attract an audience. 2019.



A short history of the Ringling Brothers Circus and the Ringling family's ties to the state of Montana - from a town named after them to the historic Bozeman Roundup rodeo. 2015.

DB104742 Battle For The Big Top: P.T. Barnum, James Bailey, John Ringling, And The Death-Defying Saga Of The American Circus by Les Standiford

A history of the American circus, focusing on three entrepreneurial showmen. The early careers of Bailey, Barnum, and Ringling; the rivalries that drove them; the mergers that led to one thriving institution; and eventual closure due to complaints from animal rights activists. 2021.


DBC04925 The Great Circus Train Wreck of 1918: Tragedy On The Indiana Lakeshore by Richard M. Lytle




Chronicles the brothers' journey from immigrant poverty to enduring glory as the kings of the circus world. 2004.

DB86718 Water For Elephants by Sara Gruen (historical fiction) 1931. Veterinary student Jacob Jankowski's world comes crashing down when his parents die in a car accident. Broke, Jacob joins the circus, falls for Marlena, a married circus star, and cares for animals like Rosie the elephant. 2006.

DB112451 The Tumbling Turner Sisters by Juliette Fay (historical fiction) In 1919 the Turner sisters and their parents are barely scraping by. When their father is injured and can no longer work, their mother decides that the vaudeville stage is their only chance for survival. Traveling by train from town to town, teenagers Gert, Winnie, and Kit and recent widow Nell soon find a new kind of freedom in the company of performers who are as diverse as their acts. There is a seamier side to the business, however, and the young women face dangers and turns of fate they never could have anticipated. 2016.

DB95545 The Life She Was Given by Ellen Marie Wiseman (mystery) In 1931, nine-year-old Lilly Blackwood is given to a circus after being kept isolated in her family's home her entire life. She finds friendship and an affinity with animals. Twenty-five years later, Julia Blackwood searches for what happened to the young girl in her mother's photos. 2017.

DB112297 Black Mouth by Ronald Malfi (paranormal thriller) Jamie Warren, his estranged brother, and their childhood friends are drawn back to their hometown to confront their memories of a strange man who taught them strange magic that led to a terrible act that still haunts them. 2022.

Art and Lily Binewski are owners of a traveling carnival. In order to
